

"Every morning I thank the Heavenly Father, grateful for my family and all those who worked on me to give me a second chance at this life on Earth," explains Humberto Turcios, an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest survival patient. Humberto suffered from cardiac arrest on October 21st of 2018. Russell Banks. Paramedic from Riggs Ambulance Service, helped save his life. As part of the cardiac chain of survival, Russell was able to quickly defibrillate Humberto three times to get pulses back. The Riggs crew continued to care for Humberto as they guickly and safely transported him to Emanuel Medical Center where he would receive post-cardiac arrest care. As a Paramedic, Russell is very humble about his work and gave credit of the out-of-hospital cardiac arrest save of Humberto to his family giving early CPR and the Medical Dispatcher who gave the pre-arrival instructions. "What really saved Humberto's life is the early recognition and CPR done by his family and the dispatcher who I could hear on the phone giving instructions for CPR," states Russell. Russell's humility, professional excellence, and dedication to providing high quality patient care to the residents of Merced County are just a few reasons why he is a Star of Life. *
